

The Invitatory and Psalter

Officiant: Gracious God, open our eyes that we may see the abundance of your creative love in all that surrounds and sustains us. Enable us to become people of hope and life, who plant the seeds of your earthly garden for the benefit of all. Help us to be gardeners and caregivers for the earth that is home for all life. Fill us with your gentle love, that we may walk tenderly on the earth, cooperating with your intention of abundant love and life. **Amen.**

Ecological Confession of Sin (Lutheran)

Note: For "Forest Sunday" in Season of Creation

Officiant:	In the name of the great Creator, Redeemer and Sustainer of the earth and its inhabitants. We gather today to celebrate God's goodness in creation, to acknowledge our complicity in harming it and to find the grace and compassion to heal it, together with God and one another.	
All:	Merciful Creator, we confess to you our blindness to your presence in creation, and our disregard for the creatures of this planet, including trees. Our human hearts are set on personal gain and material wealth, and our drive for more has caused great damage. Forgive us our sins against your beloved creatures and empower us to walk humbly with you and with one another. Reconnect us with the web of creation and lead us to the community you envision for us, the creatures of your beloved Planet Earth. Amen.	
Officiant:	God our Creator is merciful, and forgives our sins, for the sake of the one who became flesh and dwelt among us, Jesus Christ our Lord. God gives us	

new hearts to bear Christ's love to all inhabitants of the earth, and to advocate for their protection and well-being. **Amen.**

Invitatory and Psalter

Officiant:	Lord, open our lips.

The First Reading: "The Peace of Wild Things" by Wendell Berry

When despair for the world grows in me

and I wake in the night at the least sound in fear of what my life and my children's lives may be,

I go and lie down where the wood drake rests in his beauty on the water, and the great heron feeds.

I come into the peace of wild things who do not tax their lives with forethought of grief.

I come into the presence of still water, and I feel above me the day-blind stars waiting with their light.

For a time I rest in the grace of the world, and am free.

Creation's and Human's Relation with the Creator

God Created the Universe:

He spreads out the northern skies over empty space; he suspends the earth over nothing. He wraps up the waters in his clouds, yet the clouds do not burst under their weight. He covers the face of the full moon, spreading his clouds over it. The pillars of the heavens quake, aghast at his rebuke. By his power he churned up the sea. . . . By his breath the skies become fair. . . . And these are but the outer fringe of his works; how faint the whisper we hear of him! How then can we understand the thunder of his power? (Job 26:7-9, 11-14)

God Sustains the Creation:

He makes springs pour water into the ravines; it flows between the mountains. They give water to all the beasts of the field; the wild donkeys quench their thirst. The birds of the air nest by the waters; they sing among the branches. He waters the mountains from his upper changers; the earth is satisfied by the fruit of his work. He makes grass grow for the cattle, and plants for man to cultivate—bringing forth food from the earth. (Psalm 104:10-14)

God's Promise to the Animals:

The wolf will live with the lamb, the leopard will lie down with the goat, the calf and the lion and the yearling together; and a little child will lead them. The cow will feed with the bear, their youth will lie down together, and the lion will eat straw like the ox. The infant will play near the hole of the cobra, and the young child put his hand into the viper's nest. They will neither harm nor destroy on my holy mountain, for the earth will be full of the knowledge of the Lord as the waters cover the sea. (Isaiah 11:6-9)

Command to Care for Creation:

You shall not pollute the land in which you live. . . . You shall not defile the land in which you live, in which I also dwell; for I the LORD dwell among the Israelites. (Numbers 35:33-34)

The Gospel: John 15:9-17

Reader: A Reading from the Gospel of John

Jesus said to his disciples, "As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love. If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in his love. I have said these things to you so that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be complete.

"This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends. You are my friends if you do what I command you. I do not call you servants any longer, because the servant does not know what the master is doing; but I have called you friends, because I have made known to you everything that I have heard from my Father. You did not choose me but I chose you. And I appointed you to go and bear fruit, fruit that will last, so that the Father will give you whatever you ask him in my name. I am giving you these commands so that you may love one another."

Reader: Hear what the Spirit is saying to God's people.

All: Thanks be to God.

Earth Creed

All: We have come to renew our covenant with God and with one another in Christ Jesus, our Lord.

We have come to help protect God's creation.

We have come as followers of Jesus to commit ourselves anew to one another and to heal injustice and poverty.

We have come to stand together against all threats to life. We have come to discover some new beauty every day in God's creation: the sunrise and sunset, birds, flowers and trees, rainbows in the sky, the stars, the many forms of life in the forest.

We have come to listen to the "music of the universe"—water flowing over rocks, the wind, trees bending in the wind, raindrops pattering the roof.

We will remember always that God speaks to us through the beauty of his creation, and we will try our best to answer God's call to reverence all that he has created.


Laudato Si, Prayer for Our Common Home
