## Note about the music for September 17:

The hymn "God of the Sparrow" is a contemporary Christian hymn written by Jaroslav Vajda and Carl Schalk. It was first published in 1999. The lyrics of the hymn reflect the vastness of God's creation, from the smallest sparrow to the largest whale. They also express the assurance that God cares for all of his creatures.

The hymn begins by asking the question, "How does the creature say awe?" The answer is that all of creation, from the smallest sparrow to the largest whale, sings God's praises in its own way. The sparrow may chirp its song, the whale may breach the waves, and the stars may twinkle in the night sky. All of these things are expressions of God's glory.

The hymn then goes on to ask, "How does the creature say praise?" The answer is that we can praise God through our words, our actions, and our lives. We can sing his praises, pray to him, and serve him. We can also show our love for God by loving our neighbors and caring for the world around us. The hymn ends with the assurance that God cares for us. No matter how small or insignificant we may feel, God knows us and loves us. - Sean Fleming

#### John Dieffenbacher-Krall to preach at both services on Sunday, September 24

The Executive Director of the Wabanaki Alliance, John Dieffenbacher-Krall, will preach at St. Andrew's on Sunday September 24 at the 8:00 and 10:00 AM services. His topic will be "Living into the Biblical Imperative to Do Justice: How Do We Stand in Solidarity with Wabanaki Nations?"

He has been involved with the Wabanki Nations in Maine for nearly twenty years, in various capacities. Prior to being selected as Executive Director of the Wabanaki Alliance by its component tribes -- the Penobscot Nation, the Houlton Band of Maliseet Indians, the Mi'kmaq Nation and the Passamaquoddy Tribe --he was Executive Director of the Maine Indian-State Commission for twelve years and subsequently for four years was chair of the Committee on Indian Relations of the Episcopal Diocese of Maine. He co-wrote a resolution that was passed at the October 2007 Episcopal Diocesan Convention calling for the renunciation of the Doctrine of Christian Discovery, as well as a similar resolution adopted in July 2009 at the national Episcopal Church's General Convention. Since that action in 2009 a number of other religious bodies and organizations have taken similar action.

Mr. Dieffenbacher-Krall worships at St. James Episcopal Church in Old Town, not far from the Penobscot Nation on Indian Island in the Penobscot River.
