John Dieffenbacher-Krall to preach at both services this Sunday, September 24

The Executive Director of the Wabanaki Alliance, John Dieffenbacher-Krall, will preach at St. Andrew's this Sunday September 24 at the 8:00 and 10:00 AM services. His topic will be "Living into the Biblical Imperative to Do Justice: How Do We Stand in Solidarity with Wabanaki Nations?"

He has been involved with the Wabanki Nations in Maine for nearly twenty years, in various capacities. Prior to being selected as Executive Director of the Wabanaki Alliance by its component tribes -- the Penobscot Nation, the Houlton Band of Maliseet Indians, the Mi'kmaq Nation and the Passamaquoddy Tribe --he was Executive Director of the Maine Indian-State Commission for twelve years and subsequently for four years was chair of the Committee on Indian Relations of the Episcopal Diocese of Maine. He co-wrote a resolution that was passed at the October 2007 Episcopal Diocesan Convention calling for the renunciation of the Doctrine of Christian Discovery, as well as a similar resolution adopted in July 2009 at the national Episcopal Church's General Convention. Since that action in 2009 a number of other religious bodies and organizations have taken similar action.

Mr. Dieffenbacher-Krall worships at St. James Episcopal Church in Old Town, not far from the Penobscot Nation on Indian Island in the Penobscot River.

Note about the music for September 24

The hymn "Morning Has Broken" was written by Eleanor Farjeon, and first published in 1931. It is a hymn of praise for the beauty and wonder of the natural world, and for the gift of new life each morning. The hymn begins with a vivid description of the dawning of a new day: "Morning has broken like the first morning, blackbird has spoken like the first bird." Farjeon's imagery evokes the freshness and innocence of creation, and the sense of wonder and awe that we experience when we are truly present to the beauty of the natural world.

The hymn then goes on to praise God for the gift of creation: "Praise for the singing! Praise for the morning! Praise for them, springing fresh from the Word!" Farjeon reminds us that all of creation is a gift from God, and that we should be grateful for the abundance and beauty that we see around us. The second verse of the hymn focuses on the sweetness of the rain and the freshness of the garden: "Sweet the rain's new fall, sunlit from heaven, like the first dewfall on the first grass." Farjeon's imagery here reminds us of the simple joys of the natural world.

The hymn concludes with a declaration of faith: "Mine is the sunlight, mine is the morning, born of the one light Eden saw play." Farjeon reminds us that we are all part of God's creation, and that we share in the beauty and wonder of the natural world. - Sean Fleming
